This guide between Black Hawk College (BHC) and St. Ambrose University (SAU) intends to create a smooth and seamless curriculum transition for students who earn the Associate in Arts (AA) degree at BHC to transfer into the Bachelor of Arts in Psychology or Bachelor of Arts in Forensic Psychology at SAU. Concentrations in Adult Services or Child Services are incorporated in the Forensic Psychology BA degree. This guide incorporates the [Articulation Agreement between BHC and SAU](#) dated December 13, 2013, the 2021-2022 BHC catalog, and the 2021-2023 SAU catalog.

Grade Requirements	SAU will grant transfer credit for college-level work in all areas that correspond to courses offered at SAU if a grade of a “C” or better is earned.
General Education	The AA degree satisfies SAU’s lower division general education requirements except for the Health and Fitness, and Second Language categories.
Credit Hours	<u>BHC credits on this guide: 60-61. SAU credits on this guide: 59-61.</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none">✓ A minimum of 60 credits is required to complete the AA degree.✓ A minimum of 120 combined credits from BHC and SAU are required to complete the BA in Psychology or Forensic Psychology.✓ A maximum of 64 community college credits may be applied toward the BA.

Other Requirements and Recommendations

- ✓ For BHC
 - Grades of “C” or better are required for ENG 101 and ENG 102.
 - One science course must be 4 credits minimum to include a lab.
 - Completion of one Non-Western studies course is required. Course options are available as an IAI Humanities, Fine Arts, or Social and Behavioral Science course. Consult a BHC Advisor for course options.
 - A second language is required by SAU for the bachelor degree. SAU recommends completing this requirement prior to transfer. Students can complete three years of the same second language in high school, or the same second language in college (or demonstrated proficiency) through the 102-level. *Students who already meet the second language requirement may choose elective courses in the AA degree (confirm transferability with an advisor.)*

- ✓ For SAU
 - Complete a minimum of 30 credits at the 300/400 level.
 - Complete at least two writing intensive (WI) courses with a grade of “C” or better, with one taken at the 300/400 level.
 - The final 30 credits applied to the degree, or 45 of the last 60 credits, must be earned at SAU to meet the residency requirement.
 - SAU requires a Health and Fitness course which may be fulfilled at BHC with HEAL 102 (3 credits) or at SAU with KIN 149 (1 credit).
